Hounslow—London Borough of Culture 2021

Hounslow is bidding to be awarded this status in a few years time. It will put culture at the heart of the community, celebrating the unique and distinctive creativity, character, and diversity of London's boroughs. In order to develop the proposal, the borough staff are inviting contributions on what culture means to individual residents, what the borough already offers that is attractive culturally, and what more can be done.

The aim is to convince the Mayor's office with this proposal and use this award as a launching pad to boost cultural attention and investment across the borough, building an unstoppable movement of people, ideas, and opportunity.

The British Library — Sacred Texts online database

[Discovering Sacred Texts](#) is a new free British Library online learning resource, inviting visitors to explore the world's major faiths through the Library's extensive collection of sacred texts.

Available to all, the new website includes over 250 digitised collection items, teachers' resources, short films, and articles written by academics, faith leaders and practitioners, library curators, and cultural leaders. Over a hundred of these items are being made available online for the first time.

Designed for students, teachers, and lifelong learners, it features the six most-practised faiths in the UK—Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, and Sikhism, as well as a number of other faiths including the Bahá'í Faith, Jainism, and Zoroastrianism.

Community training for prevention of young suicide

Hounslow Friends of Faith have been contacted by [Papyrus](#), the national UK charity and helpline, to explore the possibility of conducting training workshops in Hounslow for community

leaders and other group representatives on this vital issue.

Become a Community Health Champion

Health Champions are people who, with relevant and free training and support, aim to transform the health and well-being of their friends, families, colleagues, and communities.

Hounslow Health Champions are part of the new Help Your Health programme—designed to reduce health inequalities in Hounslow through a programme of information, training, and volunteering.

The council will be running 2 free workshops for new Community Health Champions to help them understand how effective communication can support health messages and how to promote improvements in health and well-being to individuals.

Day 1 takes place on Wednesday 6 November 10am - 3pm, and Day 2 on Thursday 7 November 10am - 3pm.

Attendance on both days is necessary to complete the training and become a Health Champion.

Hate crime in Hounslow

In the 3 years since the Brexit Referendum (June 2016 – June 2019) 2,303 hate crimes have been reported to the police in Hounslow.

This compares to 1,729 reports in the 3 years prior to Brexit (May 2013 – May 2016). Councillor Katherine Dunne, Cabinet Member for Communities and Workforce said: "Hate crime is something that there is no place for in Hounslow. No one should be victimised or attacked because of who they are." "We want to reach out to all our communities to raise awareness of the issue and get our message out loud and clear that this will not be tolerated, and we all need to safeguard the vulnerable. If you or anyone you know has experienced hate crime, please get in touch



with our Hate Crime Advocate. Nobody should have to suffer in silence.”

Sunday 27 October

Bicentenary of the birth of the Báb celebrations

The Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of Hounslow organised a tribute, followed by two days of celebrations, to mark the anniversaries of the births of the Báb—the Prophet-Herald of their faith, and of



Bahá'u'lláh—the founder of their faith. This year marks the 200th anniversary of the birth of the Báb.

The tribute was held at Chiswick Pier House on Sunday 27 October, and the Twin Holy Days, immediately following that Sunday, were the official days of celebration for the birth of the Báb on Monday and then Bahá'u'lláh on Tuesday.

Highlights of the tribute evening on Sunday, attended by some 80 members of the community, were the puppet show, the poetry readings, and singing, all reflecting on the life of the Báb.

The Bahá'í International Community has created [a website](#) for those wishing to learn more about this special year for the Bahá'í community and how it is being observed worldwide. In addition, [Dawn of the Light](#) is a publicly available movie released in conjunction with the Bicentenary, that tells the real-life stories of 8 different Bahá'ís and their communities around the world and how they are marrying their faith with modernity, and with traditions that do not easily synchronise with their faith in 2019.

Refugees Welcome Hounslow Annual General Meeting 2019

Refugees Welcome Hounslow (RWH) members and supporters gathered at the [Hounslow Jamia Masjid and Islamic Centre](#) to reflect upon the successes and lessons learnt from welcoming 10 households over the past few years.

Furthermore, a short movie made of interviews of the first group of 10 households was debuted and will be made publicly available online in due course.

It has been confirmed that Hounslow will be welcoming 12 more individuals over the next year. The



working relationship between the RWH Executive Committee, the befriending volunteers network, and the council, continues to strengthen, and the support services provided to the arrivals have improved as a result.

A planned rotation of the RWH chairperson was successfully voted through. Particularly pleasing to see was that all members of the Executive Committee, and indeed also the wider volunteer group of RWH members, wished to continue working for the group. A further encouraging sign was the welcoming of two new Executive Committee members.

The year ahead holds more work and challenges for the group than ever: finding rental properties, making them homely, and supporting arrivals' personal and career development.

Understanding 'Honour'-Based Violence

[South West London Humanists'](#) Annual Lecture this year at Kingston University will feature Sarbjit Kaur Athwa and former Detective Chief Inspector Dr Clive Driscoll.

Sarbjit was the first person within a family connected with an 'honour' killing to testify in open court in this country. She went on to found the charity [True Honour](#), which supports victims of 'honour'-based violence, forced marriage, and female genital mutilation, especially those from South Asian communities. Clive Driscoll was the policeman who dealt with her case, and is now Vice-Chair of the charity.

This is a cultural issue which seems not to be specific to any particular faith. But it is a real—and terrifying—problem for those (mainly young women) affected.

The lecture is free, and open to everyone, though the organisers do kindly request donations to the charity on the day. As space is limited, it is important to [register in advance using this link](#), which also gives further event details.

Saturday 30 November

Saint Andrew's Day

Christian observance of the coming of Christianity to the area now known as Scotland. The martyrdom of St Andrew is remembered as the season of Advent is about to begin.
